Scripture Summaries for the Fifth Sunday After Epiphany

Isaiah 58:1-12

Written after Israel's return from exile in Babylon, this section of Isaiah addresses the malaise felt by Israel after the euphoria of their homecoming had worn off and the hard work and drudgery of rebuilding had begun. How can we let the light of God shine through us asks the passage? In the concern for neighbor, prayer, and praise is the answer. "Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am."

Psalms 112

This psalm provides instruction in right living and right faith. It is a summary statement of what faith is all about: who God is and what humans must do in response to God. "They rise in the darkness as a light for the upright; they are gracious, merciful, and righteous." We are called to work together to achieve righteousness-- right living, trust, and truth-- in this world.

1 Corinthians 2:1-12

Again, in his letter to Corinth Paul is being deliberately subversive. His power, he says, comes through the Spirit. But Paul's understanding of the Spirit is different from that of the Corinthians, who see the Spirit in terms of miracle and power. For Paul the Spirit is the Spirit of Christ, and when we seek to live in the power of the Spirit, our lives take the shape of the cross: bearing love to others even when life turns ugly - as ugly as the cross.

Matthew 5:13-20

We, like the disciples, have heard the qualities of discipleship in last week's Beatitudes. Now we are told that to be a disciple we are called to be like salt, and light, and a city on a hill that cannot be hid. To have flavour, salt must be salty. To be of use, light must not be hidden but shine forth. And to be a city on a hill is to be living out the attitudes espoused in the beatitudes. Together we are a city, gathering for a feast and hearing God's word.

The First Reading ISAIAH 58:1-12

A READING FROM THE BOOK OF ISAIAH

Shout out, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins. Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practised righteousness and did not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgements, they delight to draw near to God. "Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why humble ourselves, but you do not notice?" Look, you serve your own interest on your fast day, and oppress all your workers. Look, you fast only to quarrel and to fight and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make your voice heard on high. Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? Is it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will you call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord? Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.

If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. The Lord will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail. Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in.

The Second Reading

1 CORINTHIANS 2:1-12

A READING FROM THE FIRST LETTER OF PAUL TO THE CORINTHIANS

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God. Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written, "What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him" - these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God.
